We're celebrating 25 years of serving our community! To celebrate this milestone, Joel ben Izzy, international storyteller, has agreed to come and spin a yarn just for us.

Joel's own story is as amazing as the stories he tells. He is a storyteller who lost his voice. Surgery for thyroid cancer successfully removed the tumor but damaged a vocal cord. "Every few minutes I tried to talk, to call out," he wrote of the time after surgery in his book, *The Beggar King and The Secret of Happiness*. "Nothing but air came out...I was not dreaming. I was wide awake but could no longer speak." Nor could Joel speak in anything above a whisper for 18 months. His tale of silence is one of those rare books that is both heartwarming and full of wisdom.

Joel says of his story for our Annual Meeting, "I'm choosing stories that touch at the heart of the work Alternatives does." He'll be on hand, after the meeting, to autograph his book and CDs.

We're excited about our 25th celebration. There'll be good food, fellowship and awards for Volunteer of the Year, Student Volunteer of the Year and the Jeff Furman Award for Social Responsibility in Business.

OUR SECOND CREDIT PATH® SEMINAR FOR PRACTITIONERS

On April 19 - 20 Alternatives hosted its second Credit Path Seminar for Practitioners. Participants came from California, Louisiana, Wisconsin, Mississippi, Pennsylvania, New York and even Nigeria to get training on Alternatives Credit Path model. Alternatives Credit Path, and the products and services that help move people along the path towards financial self-sufficiency, has attracted attention from our peers in credit unions and the wider community economic development field. Organizations around the country are interested in replicating our programs.

Training included information on our programs to help the underserved. Individual Development Accounts, MoneyWise classes and Business CENTS' *Getting Down to Business* sparked particular interest.
